Play Frances the Firefly video, or read from booklet or Powerpoint book. Re-cap and discuss key messages then complete the colouring-in sheet.

The Computer Maze Game





Move your computer mouse through 3 levels of the house without touching the walls. Stay low to avoid the smoke. Click the hydrants to find the axes to break the doors down.

Follow the instructions then click on the picture of the house at the end of the maze to put the fire out.

Causes of Fire - laminated pictures and fire safety discussion





Explain to the class that there 7 main causes of fire in the house. Ask pupils to suggest what those causes might be? Display the corresponding laminated sheet and discuss in brief the key dangers and how to stay safe from the following:

- Cooking don't leave unattended; keep flammable materials away from heat; keep pan handles pointing in
- **Cigarettes** never leave smouldering or unattended; empty ashtrays safely, add water if in doubt
- Fireplace don't get too close; never throw anything onto the fire; always use a fire guard
- Candles never leave unattended; always place on a solid base; keep away from flammables
- Electrics overloaded sockets; damaged/frayed cords
- Matches and lighters discuss in more detail:
 ask what they are used for? why are they dangerous?
 ask if they see them at home? what are they used for?
 ask where matches and lighters are kept at home?
 ask them to remind parents that they should be kept out of reach of children
 - advise that if they find matches or lighters lying around they should tell an adult do not pick up or play with them
